- Presbyterian Disaster Assistance
- Presbyterian Hunger Program
- Self-Development of People

First Cluster Meeting of the Presbytery

The Southwest Cluster of the Presbytery of Sierra Blanca met at 10 AM on Saturday the 23rd of February at the First Presbyterian Church in Las Cruces. The Deming and Santa Teresa churches were represented, but both the Iglesia del Pueblo and Bridge ministers were ill and unable to attend.

As the host church, the Las Cruces First Presbyterian Church was well represented by its Minister and the Cluster Moderator, Reverend Norm Story, Presbytery Commissioners Steve Loman, Lloyd Kirschenmann, and Richard Paul; along with Rev. Carroll Blevins, Rev. Marcus Burr, and 10 Elders and Deacons. The Deming Church was represented by Rev. Larimore Wickett, Clerk of Session, Liv Johnson, and two members; and the Santa Teresa Church was represented by their Presbytery Commissioner Ward Champion. Rev. Joan Swanson, the pastor serving Good Sam Village, was also in attended.

The First Presbyterian Congregational Life Ministry Team provided coffee and donuts that were very much appreciated by all. Moderator Story opened the meeting in prayer and then asked everyone to introduce themselves, state their church affiliation, and tell a bit about that church. He answered questions and briefed everyone



about the organization of the four clusters into which the Presbytery has been divided. It was pointed out that the Presbytery would have a Leadership Team which would consist of an elected Presbytery Moderator, the past Moderator, and the four Cluster Moderators. The Cluster Moderator is elected to a two-year term. Rev. Story expressed the expectation that he would serve only one term.

Commissioner Ward Champion told the group that the Santa Teresa Church was founded in the late 70's or early 80's and has about 20 to 25 active members, most of whom he described as "mature" Their main problem was getting ministers via their pulpit supply process. He expressed the hope that the locally controlled cluster structure would make it easier for them to find available ministers from El Paso. He gave some interesting details of the arrangements that his congregation had made which permitted a Spanish speaking Seventh Day Adventist church to rent his church when it was not being used by the Santa Teresa organization. This arrangement was not a moneymaking proposition, but it had the complete support of his congregation and had a beneficial effect on their church life.

Reverend Wickette said that his Deming church has grown about 20% over the past three years, He attributed the growth to the welcoming nature of the congregation. He told of their difficulty repairing storm damage and thanked the Las Cruces church

for providing assistance in locating a reliable company to repair loose siding on a corner of their church building. He was very interested in keeping the local churches informed about the actions of Presbytery as well as the happenings in our cluster.

The Las Cruces church mentioned their music program and the outreach nature of the annual Trunk or Treat program

One of the questions posed by Moderator Story was: What do we want from the Presbytery, or what do we want the Presbytery to do? Moderator Story said that the best way for anyone interested in what's happening in the Presbytery is to log on to the web site (http://www.sierrablanca.org) and click on the topic of interest. Those who do not have a login name and password can create them online during their first visit. He asked everyone in attendance to make sure they included their email address on the sign-in sheet so we can include them in our distribution lists for our Good News and Lantern publications.

The Deming church volunteered to host the next Cluster meeting at 10 AM on Saturday, April 6, well before the next Presbytery meeting on April 26-27 at the First Presbyterian Church in Carlsbad.

Youth Activities

The youth are in their busiest time of the year. It started with the annual Superbowl of Caring on January 27. The Souperbowl of Caring is a national movement that once a year collects food and money for local missions and food banks. We brought in over 150 cans and boxes of food for the food bank. We thank everyone for your support and participation in this worthy cause. I have not received numbers on how much was brought in nationally but it is exciting to be a part of something this big.

The next weekend we had the Sub sandwich sale. This was a big success. We sold



more sandwiches than in any of the past four years. We had 139 orders for sandwiches and made 156 sandwiches, most of which we were able to sell. We were able to bring in as profit \$701 for our trips this summer. All 14 of the youth and three parents that helped worked extremely hard to make this a good experience with good food. The reviews that I heard suggest we succeeded on both goals.

On February 16 the elders had their annual retreat here at the church. To help them make it through the day and to be sure that they did not leave hungry, the youth made fajitas, beans, rice, chips and salsa, and cake for dessert. The Elders were very pleased and the youth did a wonderful job, preparing, serving, and cleaning up.

Finally, February 24 was the annual meeting and enchilada dinner. The youth every year serve enchiladas for the congregation as a fundraiser. This year we did enchiladas, beans, rice, salad, chips and salsa, with ice cream for dessert. For our efforts, the youth were able to bring in over a thousand dollars minus expenses. We had a great crew of 13 youth and four adult helpers that spent from 9 AM to around 1:30 PM working hard to make sure everything turned out well.

The youth are very active and have a great attitude about this summer and the things we will be doing the next year. The middle school is going to a youth conference in Gunnison, CO for a week of getting closer to God, meeting other Christians their age from around the county, and learning to live as a follower of Christ. The high school is going to San Diego to work at homeless shelters, soup kitchens, and other service organizations in the greater San Diego area. These trips are great opportunities for the youth to get in touch with God and figure out where their relationship is with Him. They often can get out of this one week as much or more than an entire years worth of sermons or church services combined.

Sunday Morning Order of Worship

At the February Music & Worship Ministry Team meeting the question was asked "Is there a place specified [in our Book of Order] for receiving of the offering?"

The quick answer is no. It says "worship is shaped by history, culture, and contemporary need." Worship shall include Scripture reading, prayers, observing of the sacraments—Baptism and the Lord's Supper, and receiving of tithes and offerings. Worship for the Lord's Day may include music, times for gathering and sharing, and services of receiving new members, officers, and those in life's transitions.

All suggested orders start with a Call to Worship, Hymn of Praise, Confession of Sin, Assurance of God's Love, and Response. You will be comfortable with a similar worship order when visiting other Presbyterian churches and most reformed theology communions.

Here at First Presbyterian we have a gathering time for our Sunday morning service and deal with the busyness of activities the first thing. Then we pause, have a meditation as we break the time from our separate lives and come together when the worship leader leads the call to worship. We include a musical response. It takes a variety of forms, depending on the season, the message, or musicians who offer their talent.

A recent Sunday it was piano; it might be another hymn or a choir anthem with choral scholar solo; or the response could be a choral 'amen.' The elements of the service that follow are not necessarily the same every Sunday. An important reason to vary the service is the extent to which the children will be involved. Our Book of Order instructs, "Children bring special gifts to worship and grow in faith through their regular inclusion and participation ..." We always make a place for a Young Disciples message to provide in a simplified way the Scripture Lesson message.

Prior to children coming forward for their special time, different parts of the service are included for them to experience. Sometimes the offering is received early. Some-

times a choir anthem fits, the bells play, or the Salt & Light singers offer their meditation. Sometimes special prayers are included before the younger children are invited to their special church school program. A particular hymn or the choir anthem that Director Klement has chosen may fit best as a prayer response. Or the words may be an apt summary of a sermon topic and best be scheduled as an offering toward the end of the service. Rev. Norm and David Klement meet each week along with organist Smolleck and others who will be a part of the service to bring together all the elements of worship. Ultimately they seek to present, in the most meaningful order, a message toward which all have been working for many weeks.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner



The Congregational Life and Outreach Team (CLO) held a Shrove Tuesday pancake supper on February 12. This was the first time this traditional event was held in our church. Almost 50 members of our congregation took part.

The traditional pancakes were served along with sausage and bacon. Syrup was, of course, available including a special strawberry syrup made by Nora Yaryan.

Traditionally the meal was designed to use up rich food before the beginning of fasting during Lent. Here the CLO also used it as a means to introduce members to the work of the various Session Committees. The CLO has the most active table. The Administration and the Music and Worship tables also had some committee members who discussed church business with some of the congregation.

In-Betweeners

On February 22, the In-Betweeners held a potluck and heard a presentation on the topic "Daily Life in the Spanish Presidios, 1730 - 1810.

The presentation was made by Mark Santiago, the director of the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum. The talk presented some details which were unknown to many who listened.

The Presidios were a line of forts about which small towns often grew. These formed a line roughly on the US - Mexico border. The talk focused on the soldiers who manned the forts. It touched on the backgrounds, social standing, family life, and equipment of the common soldier, complete with detailed pictures of the different types of soldiers.

The food was as good and as varied as usual, The desserts, which included key lime and cherry pies, caused many to break their diets.
